MICHAEL CARRIER published *Innovation for the 21st Century: Harnessing the Power of Intellectual Property and Antitrust Law* with OXFORD UNIVERSITY PRESS. The book was the subject of the first-ever blog symposium at the leading antitrust blog, Truth on the Market, and was cross-posted on the most popular patent blog, Patently O. Seven patent, copyright, and antitrust scholars critiqued the book, and Michael responded the following day.

Michael edited a new volume, *Critical Concepts in Intellectual Property Law: Competition*, which will be published by EDWARD ELGAR PUBLISHING.

Michael accepted an offer to publish an article on pharmaceutical patent settlements in the MICHIGAN LAW REVIEW.

As part of the GEORGE MASON LAW REVIEW's 12th Annual Symposium on Antitrust Law, Michael provided commentary on antitrust papers by Einer Elhauge and Tad Lipsky.

Michael spoke to the Rutgers IP club on P2P and other dual-use technologies, and, by invitation, presented his latest work to senior staff at the Federal Trade Commission.

ROGER CLARK continues to be active on issues involving the International

Criminal Court. The Court's Special Working Group on the Crime of Aggression, of which he has been a prominent member, recently completed draft amendments to the treaty setting up the Court which will enable the Court to exercise its jurisdiction over the crime of aggression. These amendments will be considered by the Review Conference on the treaty in Kampala, Uganda, in June 2010.

Roger has given several speeches recently on piracy. He has speaking engagements in Austria and New Zealand this summer.

He did not run a personal worst time in this spring's School Run.

Among his several recent publications on international criminal law is an article entitled "State Obligations Under the Genocide Convention" which appeared in volume 61 of the RUTGERS LAW REVIEW (the journal of the "other" Rutgers Law School).

KIM FERZAN co-authored the book *Crime and Culpability: A Theory of Criminal Law* which was published by CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY PRESS in March 2009. In May 2009, the University of Illinois' Institute for Law and Philosophy will sponsor a conference on the book.

Kim's article entitled "The Perils of Forgetting Fairness" (co-authored with Michael Dorff) was accepted by CASE

WESTERN RESERVE LAW REVIEW. Kim also wrote, "Intention," for the second edition of the BLACKWELL COMPANION to the PHILOSOPHY OF LAW AND LEGAL THEORY (D. Patterson ed.).

In April 2009, Kim batted around the concepts of justification and excuse when she served as the outside reader for a Ph.D. dissertation in the Rutgers – New Brunswick Philosophy Department.

This spring, Kim also presented her co-authored work-in-progress, "Beyond the Special Part" at FSU and Fordham law schools.

This summer, Kim will be working on a book review (on law, the planet Pluto, and conceptual analysis) that will appear in the MICHIGAN LAW REVIEW.

JILL FRIEDMAN has a new title to reflect her role at the Law School: Director of Pro Bono and Public Interest Programs.

In addition to serving children in detention centers, schools and other community settings, Street Law partnered in 2009 with the Law School's National Lawyers Guild chapter to provide practical law-related education to adult female inmates at the Federal Detention Center. Jill led the Delaware Valley law schools, in a collaboration with Philadelphia VIP and the Prisoner Re-entry Program, for the Federal District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania. In the newly established Prisoner Re-entry Pro Bono Project, law

students from Rutgers-Camden and the other area law schools can now conduct legal intake in a program designed to decrease recidivism and promote successful reintegration for former felons after lengthy periods of incarceration.

In January, Jill was elected to serve on the Board of Directors for New Jersey Volunteer Lawyers for the Arts. NJVLA provides legal education, representation, and other legal services to New Jersey's arts community, and in particular, to low income artists and non-profit arts organizations.

Also in January, Jill was elected to the Board of Trustees of the LEAP Academy University Charter School. Established in 1997 through a partnership with Rutgers University, today LEAP Academy serves 780 students from kindergarten through twelfth grade and also hosts a 90-student preschool program in cooperation with Rutgers. LEAP's academic agenda focuses on college-preparatory learning and experiences intended to raise students' college awareness, preparedness, and attendance.

Jill was selected by the members of the Women's Law Caucus to be the recipient of their annual Faculty Award, which was presented on April 15.

In March, Bill McLaughlin and Jill oversaw the Law School's participation in the first annual national Marshall Brennan Moot Court Competition. The Fellows coached a delegation of 12 high school students to argue appellants' and petitioners' positions in a First Amendment case. Camden

progressed to the Competition Finals (Final Four).

SALLY GOLDFARB enjoyed participating in the weekly interdisciplinary seminar at the Institute for Research on Women in New Brunswick during the 2008-09 academic year. The theme of the seminar was “The Culture of Rights/The Rights of Culture.” As a faculty fellow, Sally presented a paper on the successes and failures of domestic violence law and commented on other seminar participants’ works-in-progress.

In February, Sally participated in a symposium on women’s rights law at Rutgers School of Law – Newark. She delivered a paper analyzing the Violence Against Women Act in light of differing schools of thought within feminist legal theory. The symposium celebrated the publication of the new book *Equal: Women Reshape American Law*. In the book, author Fred Strebeigh chronicles the battle for women’s legal rights in the late twentieth century. The book devotes several chapters to the work of Sally Goldfarb and others to pass the Violence Against Women Act.

In April, Sally spoke at a symposium commemorating the fifteenth anniversary of the Violence Against Women Act at Georgetown University Law Center. Vice-President Biden, who was the Act’s principal sponsor when he was in the Senate, was the featured speaker at the symposium. The proceedings will be

published in the *GEORGETOWN JOURNAL OF GENDER AND THE LAW*.

Along with Professor Bob Williams, Sally led a discussion of the same-sex marriage litigation in California as part of the American Constitution Society’s brown bag lunch series.

ELLEN GOODMAN has been advising the incoming FCC Chairman on media issues and will be conducting a seminar on public media policy issues at the FCC in May. Ellen spoke at the Press Club on FCC Reform in January.

Ellen has also been working with the Ford Foundation on reforming public media policy and will be speaking at the Ford’s gathering of public media grantees in May.

Ellen presented her paper on Public Media 2.0 at UCLA Law School, and at the conferences convened by the New America Foundation and the Free State Foundation in Washington.

In May, Ellen will be presenting at the Press Club in Washington at the Quello Center Communications Law and Policy Symposium on Rethinking Media Policy in the Age of New Media. In connection with her work on green communications, she moderated a panel for Penn’s Initiative for Global Environmental Leadership on policy directions with respect to green marketing. Ellen will speak in June at the ABA Consumer Protection and Antitrust conference on green marketing.

Ellen's article entitled "Spectrum Policy and the Public Interest" will be published this spring in the JOURNAL OF TELECOM AND HIGH TECHNOLOGY LAW. Her chapter on "Public Media 2.0" was published in early 2009 in *And Communications for All... A Policy Agenda for a New Administration*. Ellen's book chapter on "Spectrum Policy" was published in *Television Goes Digital* in early 2009.

JOANNE GOTTESMAN was appointed to serve on the New Jersey Supreme Court Special Civil Part Practice Committee. The appointment is through August 31, 2010.

RICHARD HYLAND's book entitled *Gifts: A Study in Comparative Law* was published by OXFORD UNIVERSITY PRESS in April.

HARRIET KATZ's article entitled "Counseling Externship Students" was published this spring in the CLINICAL LAW REVIEW.

ARTHUR LABY completed a co-authored book chapter entitled "The Competition of Systems in the Market for Listings," to be included in *Economic Law as an Economic Good*, to appear this summer. Early in the year, Arthur held a public discussion with Peter Wallison of the American Enterprise Institute on the causes of the financial crisis. The transcript is to be published in the

Arthur had several other speaking engagements during the spring. He was a discussant on a paper presented at Temple Law School on "Judicial Gatekeepers." He was a commentator on an insider trading paper at a conference on securities market regulation held at the Notre Dame Business School. Most recently, Arthur spoke on a panel at Temple entitled "Regulatory Responses to Complexity" as part of a conference on the credit crisis.

GREG LASTOWKA has been a visiting professor at Columbia Law School and has been working on his book *Virtual Law* which will be published in 2010 by YALE PRESS.

In April, Greg spoke at Columbia Business School at a conference on new business models for user-generated content. His interdisciplinary article entitled "The Planes of Power" was recently published in the online journal GAME STUDIES: THE INTERNATIONAL JOURNAL OF COMPUTER GAMES RESEARCH.

DENNIS PATTERSON will be visiting for one month at the University of New South Wales Law Faculty in Sydney, Australia, as the Julius Stone Distinguished Visiting Professor of Law. Dennis has several legal theory articles appearing in the next few months, as well as an Italian translation of his book *Law and Truth*. His book with Ari Afilalo, *The New Global*

Trading Order, will appear in paperback this fall from CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY PRESS.

SARAH RICKS was selected as a recipient for the Chancellor's Award for Teaching Excellence, a Camden campus-wide prize to be presented at the Law School's graduation.

In March 2009, Sarah was elected to the American Law Institute. She joined the Lexis/Nexis Research Advisory Board in April.

The Women's Law Caucus honored Sarah with a 2009 Faculty Appreciation Award.

Sarah was a guest presenter in April at a Rutgers-Camden Women's Studies class on "Procedural Due Process: The Failed Attempt to Create a Constitutional Right to Enforce Protection from Abuse Orders."

SHEILA RODRIGUEZ presented "'Food Animals': How Animal Advocates Have Used the Law to Promote the Ethical Treatment of Selected Species" at the Rutgers - Camden Spring 2009 Graduate Liberal Studies Lecture Series, You Are What You Eat: Dimensions of Food.

ALLAN STEIN's third edition of *Silberman, Stein & Wolff, Civil Procedure: Theory and Practice*, will be published by ASPEN this summer.

BOB WASHBURN moderated a seminar entitled "Trends in Land Use Law" at the Atlantic Builders Convention in April. Bob was also moderator and speaker at a seminar entitled "Surviving Economic Downturns" at the Atlantic Builders Convention.

BOB WILLIAMS's book, *The Law of American State Constitutions*, is in press at OXFORD UNIVERSITY PRESS and is due to be out in September.

Bob's article entitled "Should the Oregon Constitution be Revised, and if so, How Should it be Accomplished?" will be published this month in the OREGON LAW REVIEW.
